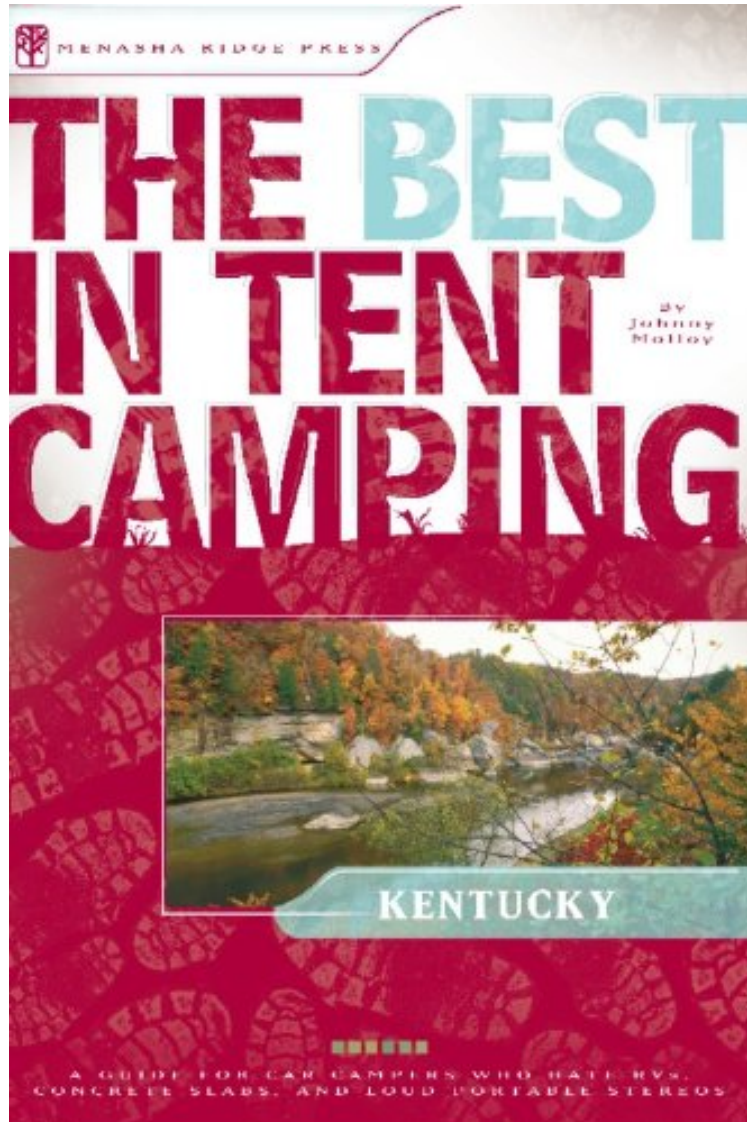

There are some great campgrounds in the guide, but campers looking for privacy, quiet, and a lack of RV's will be disappointed with many of the featured campgrounds. The four campsites at Kingdom Come State Park, for example, are on a small "island" surrounded by a road to and from the picnic area. You're literally on display to anyone passing through! It sucks. Not the type of camping I was looking for. Most people would rather sleep in an RV at Walmarts and I can't blame them. Other campgrounds are just as disappointing. Carter Caves State Park shouldn't even be in the guide. The park has made absolutely no effort to provide anything that I would want as a tent camper. No privacy, no scenery. It's like public housing for campers. Why anyone would feature it as a tent-camping destination is beyond my understanding. In short, just because a campground is in this book doesn't mean that you should camp there . . . . . which was sort of the point of the book I thought.
