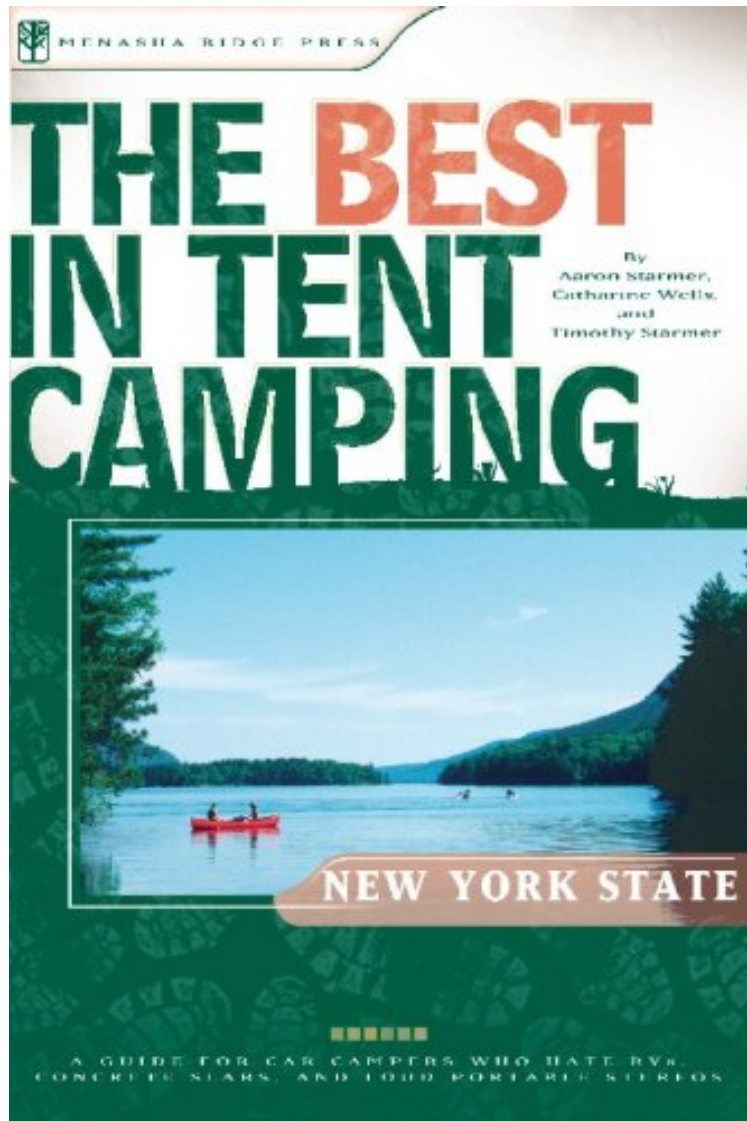

Far too many shoulder-to-shoulder-campsite state parks are included. Not much of that in this series in general but if you read carefully you'll do OK and get some good ideas.
